- We want to prepare you for life beyond school, ensuring that they leave us as well-rounded, confident and reflective individuals, well-prepared for the challenges ahead.



Dress code



Smart, formal trousers or a skirt of a modest length

Study periods, additional study and time management

- A level courses require students to work substantially beyond lessons. Students are required to develop independent study skills and research and read around their subjects.
- Students should view their time in the Sixth Form as a full time job and make their learning a priority.
- As a general guide, students should be studying 3-4 hours per day beyond their lessons, either in school or at home.



Study periods, additional study and time management

- Students are set homework and coursework assignments, plus revision for tests, assessments and examinations, all of which should take place outside of lessons.
- Our advice is to fully utilise the study periods in school, which will then free up more time for leisure pursuits outside of school hours.
- No more than 8 hours employment per week



Transport

- As with all Sixth Forms and Colleges, EWS
 Sixth Form students do not qualify for a free
 bus pass to use the school transport. If they
 wish to travel on school transport, they will
 need to apply for a non-entitled Student Bus
 Pass.
- Further information can be obtained through the 'School Transport' section of the County Council website
- There is a Sixth Form bursary available to support with transport costs
- The travel between the two sites is funded by the school. Students should not use their own transport to travel between campuses, they should use the school transport provided.

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

Things I wish I knew before I started Sixth Form



Know what you're getting into

You should've already researched the Alevels you've chosen, but if in the first lessons you find yourself hating the course and think there's absolutely no chance you'll be able to cope with it getting progressively harder, talk to your head of sixth form.

There's a chance you could change subjects in the first couple of weeks rather than six months down the line.



Have (realistic) expectations of yourself

- After GCSEs it's easy to think you can just waltz into sixth form; the gap between GCSEs and A-levels is big.
- Setting a realistically ambitious target for your A-level grades will help you keep on track to achieve them.



Study periods are for work and play

 Make use of private study time in your frees for tying up loose ends with your work and actually doing homework, but also remember that interacting with new people is unavoidable in sixth form, especially in your first year when new friendship groups are being made.



Life after Sixth Form

 Start thinking about Post 18 options. What experiences/ qualification will you need to have?



Don't forget your teachers are human

- If you've been ill or buried under essays for other teachers and have been unable to complete work on time or you're struggling to understand something, just go and talk to them.
- Chances are, they'll be more than happy to go over things with you rather than see you lag behind, and will extend deadlines for you if you explain rather than lie or make excuses on the day.



Stay motivated

- Once you've settled into sixth form life, the weather starts getting colder and the nights start drawing in; it's so tempting to binge-watch a whole season of Stranger Things on Netflix.
- Stay motivated finishing reading over the textbook chapter questions may seem pointless now when you know the teacher isn't going to mark them but they'll help your understanding in the long term.
- This year will fly past!

Learn as a community

- Establish a group chat or study group for your classes so you can all share resources or discuss work.
- It's enormously handy when someone forwards helpful websites or handouts and lets you know you're not alone in the struggle to do well.



Don't lose yourself in a mountain of notes

- The best way to stay organised in sixth form is to continue habits from your GCSE years.
- Use separate notebooks for different subjects and file away handouts in respective subject folders.
- It's easy to become bewildered at the 'bring your own paper' aspect of sixth form, but the sooner you get on top of your organisation, the sooner it becomes a habit that won't think twice about.



Cornell Notes:


This is deemed the best note-taking in the world.

- You will need to store a vast amount of knowledge in your Long Term Memory.
- Your Working Memory is relatively small (5 to 7 things), while your Long Term Memory is vast.
- You need to organise the information into schema in order to access or recall it.
- You need to adopt a systematic approach to learning, rather leaving it chance.



Note Taking in Lessons: Cornell

- Always have a title this makes finding what you need easy.
- Your exercise margin may be big enough as the cue column.
- Every page / lesson should have a brief summary.
- The **cue column** and summary may be beneficial to do 24 hours (or more) after the lesson.
- This is generally regarded as the best note taking system in the world.





How to take Cornell notes


After class

Highlighting: Highlight important information

Cues and questions:

Create a few hints to remind you of the content

Summary: Make a brief summary of what you learned that lesson








Did you get all 10?

- 1. LEAP There is a leap from GCSE, even if you achieved top GCSE grades
- 2. SPEED The speed of sixth form lessons is far quicker
- 3. DISCIPLINE Less spoon-feeding so students need to keep up with work
- 4. INDEPENDENT learn how to work by yourself more
- 5. SELF-MOTIVATION less checking up by teachers about how much work you do at home
- 6. NOTE-TAKING learn to take decent notes from the start as there's limited time to go back
- 7. ORGANISATION be organised from the start as you will be overwhelmed otherwise
- 8. PRACTISE RECALL as there is too much content to learn if you leave it to Year 13
- 9. ESSAY WRITING SKILLS work on these from the start as the skills required only get harder
- 10. KNOW YOUR STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES and work on your weaknesses in Year 12
